# Getting information to parents and carers: PAS publishes practice note

Parents and carers want information about all sorts of issues connected to bringing up children. They also need good quality information to help them make choices which will affect them and their children. So, what's the best way to get this to them? PAS has written this practice note to help guide services which produce information for parents and carers.

#### Read On Get On

Over one in ten children in Scotland are already behind in their language skills by age three. Children experiencing poverty are twice as likely as their peers to be behind. The **Read On Get On campaign**, wants to get all five-year-olds ready to read for day one of primary one, and able to read well by the end of primary seven.
